Resources from Apple

It would be nice if everything on the iPhone or the Mac were just, well – intuitive. But, that’s not always the case.

On your iPhone, download the free **iPhone Manual** from the Apple Books app. You can highlight and bookmark anything you want to refer back to later. Locate the **Tips App** for some enlightening iPhone tips. The app could be hidden in the Extras folder. Your older clients will love to know about this one! Also, subscribe to the [Apple Support](#) channel on YouTube for bite-sized Mac related videos.

For troubleshooting, download the [Apple Support](#) app from the App Store on your iPhone to quickly find answers to common questions. On the web, go to the [Photos Apple Support](#) page. To get help from Apple for software, hardware, and iCloud issues, have your client make an appointment with a genius or call **Apple Support** at 800 275 2273. Ask for a Creative to help you with Photos. They can remotely access your client’s computer. You may find answers to tech headaches in the online **Apple Support Communities**. For tech help on Macs that Apple won’t service, find someone who works with older Macs in your area.

If you have an **Apple store** near you, on the **Apple Store app**, sign up for one of the many **Today at Apple** sessions. Go on a photo walk to try out the newest iPhones in case your client has acquired the bigger and shinier new iPhone before everyone else. Learn or review the basics directly with a **Product Skills** session. Unfortunately, the small group workshops previously called Studio Hours are gone.

Traditionally in September, Apple announces the new products released in the fall at their [Special Event](#). Make sure to watch it online to be ahead of the game. The new versions of iOS and MacOS (and now iPadOS) are released later in the year. Journalists have the time to test the iOS beta versions during the summer, ahead of everyone else, and will review them before they are released to the public. You don’t have to rush into updating to a new operating system right away, but most important is to keep abreast of these changes, so you are ready if your clients update their operating systems before you do.

To continue designing photo books within Apple Photos, use extensions such as [MPix](#), [Mimeo](#), [Motif](#), [PrestoPhoto](#), and Shutterfly available in the App Store.
